Also in 2020, Youngzine celebrated its 10th anniversary. Youngzine was born out of a realization that we are raising children in an increasingly interdependent world -- and an invisible virus has shown us just that.

When schools began shutting down last April and teachers were looking for credible online resources that explained the developing news to their students, we stepped up to help. We opened our content to educators without requiring logins and created a Spanish version of our articles at the request of ESL teachers. Our work was recommended by several local and international publications, doubling our web traffic.



A NEW DIRECTION

Climate change impacts all of us. And there is no doubt that it will be the defining issue of the 21st century, and our children will not only be impacted, but will need to lead the way in finding sustainable solutions.

In a recent NPR survey of 500 teachers nationally, 65% said climate change does not relate to the subjects they teach. 17% said they don't know enough about it. And in another survey of middle and high school teachers, 55-70% said they don't feel confidently about the issues themselves.

Over the past two years, we have worked with a scientist at Stanford University to develop comprehensive and age-appropriate climate change content. Our approach is designed to be interdisciplinary, and different aspects of the content can be used by ELA, STEM, or Humanities teachers.

We wrapped up a pilot in classrooms in Spring 2021, and based on teacher feedback, are in the process of designing lesson plans that spark critical thinking in students by asking them to reason based on data and evidence, and to formulate solutions by considering the different stakeholders. " I loved the comprehensive content and connection to news articles. Most of the sites like NOAA have some aspects of the content I can use. But the fact that Youngzine's climate content is broad and not focused on just the science makes it stand out in terms of something I would use in my classroom. I had my students take one greenhouse gas each and understand the sources as well as look ahead to how we can mitigate their use."
